#### **METROPOLITAN VETERINARY ASSOCIATES:**

As a child, did you always know you wanted to be a veterinarian?

**JERRY NORTHINGTON:** No. My father was a mixed practice veterinarian so I grew up making farm calls and working for his practice. I went to college with ideas of being a physician, but found early that was not a good fit for my life. I changed to veterinary medicine as an undergraduate student after my


discharge from the U.S. Army.

**MVA:** Why did you decide to specialize in neurology?

JN: As a senior veterinary student, I was introduced to the field by one of the pioneers of veterinary neurology, Dr. B.F. Horlein. He opened a door that I had not seen before. The many different facets of veterinary medicine are difficult to see until someone comes along to show the way. Dr. Horlein was instrumental in my obtaining an internship after veterinary school and from there, my course in veterinary neurology continued.

**MVA:** What do you like most about being a veterinary neurologist?

JN: The nervous system is a fantastic black box and the mystery of its workings are a continuing source of amazement. Today we see the advent of molecular biology along with imaging technology that advances at regular intervals.



There is always something new and different to learn or to see in the clinic.

**MVA:** What's the funniest story from your career?

**JN:** People watching has long been an interest of mine - observing the actions of humans is intriguing. People say and do the strangest things.

The connection was obvious to us, but the situation in Alabama culture of the early 70's was pretty embarrassing to us students. **MVA:** What neurological condition do you wish there was an effective treatment and/or cure for?

**JN:** Degenerative myelopathy, the spinal cord disease affecting so many dog breeds these days. No real treatment is known for canine patients with this condition.

**MVA:** What sort of tips or advice might you give a beginning veterinary neurologist?

**JN:** Always keep an open mind and watch for new avenues of both treatment and diagnosis. The excitement of new and different never ceases in this field, so be prepared.

**MVA:** What are you most looking forward to in the coming years? Any special places you are hoping to travel?

JN: There are many facets of life that are not well explored while working. I'm looking forward to more involvement in local activities and social action. I'm also hoping to return to Europe and do more travel in the continental U.S., where the American southwest holds particular interest.

**MVA:** If there was a movie produced about your life, who would play you and why?

**JN:** This is impossible. For many years I have not been a movie or video watcher. The names and characteristics of modern actors are beyond my range of knowledge.

**MVA:** Finally – an extremely important question – are you a dog person or a cat person?

JN: Both in fact. I've been a dog and cat owner for many years. The current population is just cats, but a dog may return to my household one day.

When I think of all of the veterinarians who care for our personal and rescue animals, the first person that comes to mind is Dr. Jerry Northington. He has been caring for our dogs since 2010, when we walked into Metropolitan with our recently rescued, blind dog Sprout, who had started having seizures.

He diagnosed Sprout with hydrocephalus, and an MRI confirmed 1mm of functioning brain. Through our journey with Sproutie, Dr. Northington was always honest with us and never gave up on Sprout. He took the time to meet with us, answered our calls and emails, and taught us so much about hydrocephalus, and how life might unfold for the dog we adored – and who changed our lives. He cared enough to take the time and be patient with us, and was there to console us when the end was drawing near. Though some may not have expected Sprout to live more than a couple of weeks, he surprised us all and thrived in our family for over two years. Our little miracle dog responded very well for a long time to the therapies put in place by Dr. Northington, and exceeded all of our expectations on what he could physically do. Sprout touched so many lives – from being rescued and inspiring

us to start Finding Shelter, until the day he died. We are ever grateful to Dr. Northington for everything he did to make Sprout's life better.

Because we learned so much from Dr. Northington while caring for Sprout, we rescued and took chances on dogs who might have neurological issues, knowing that Dr. Northington would give us an accurate diagnosis, and support the caregivers and adopters who would welcome these special dogs into their lives.

To honor Sprout's memory and to fill an aching hole in our hearts, we adopted two puppies from a puppy mill – Ollie and Tooch. And the first person we introduced them to was Dr. Northington. With wide open fontanels, Dr. Northington confirmed that both boys have severe hydrocephalus and 3mm of functioning brain. Yet through the guidance of the doctor we love and trust so much, our

happy and sweet boys have thrived for four years and counting, going trick or treating every year at MVA just to visit Dr. Northington! We have also added two more neurological dogs to our family - Abby and Penelope - and fostered others with the confidence that we could manage care and have the support of Dr. Northington, no matter what the diagnosis or how long the dog might live. We know that it takes a great deal of intelligence and skill to become a veterinarian, particularly a specialist. But it takes the compassion of a wonderful person to make clients feel as though their appointments do not have a scheduled end time, that they are welcome from the moment they enter the waiting room, and that they will have support through the toughest times. It is why Finding Shelter honored Dr. Northington with our inaugural "Veterinarian of the Year" award at the 6th Annual Sproutfest.
