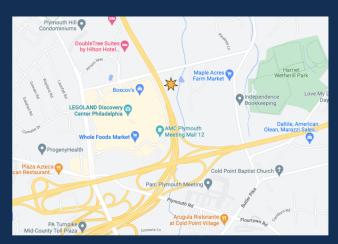

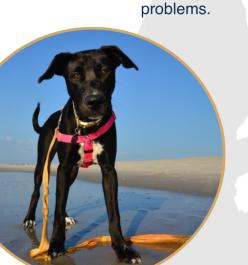
# Meet Our Behaviorist

## What is Veterinary Behavior?

Veterinary Behavior is the equivalent of Psychiatry and Psychology in human medicine. Board Certified Veterinary Behaviorists (DACVBs) manage and treat animals behavior problems to improve the quality of life of pets, working animals, zoo and farm animals and of the people who care for them.

As veterinarians, DACVBs can diagnose medical conditions that may be impacting an animal's behavior and have a full range of treatment options to help your pet, including medication. Many people come to us after working with trainers or following advice from friends, family or other well-meaning people but still have concerns. The patients that we treat don't have training problems, they have anxieties. That is what drives their behavior problems.





# What happens at an appointment?

We will review your pet's history and observe their behaviors during the appointment. At no point will we try to provoke aggression or anxiety. Our goal is for you and your pet to have as positive an experience as possible. It's important that you understand not just what your pet is doing but why, that is the best way to help you help your pet. You will be given a written assessment and treatment plan prepared specifically for your pet which we will review during the consult.
